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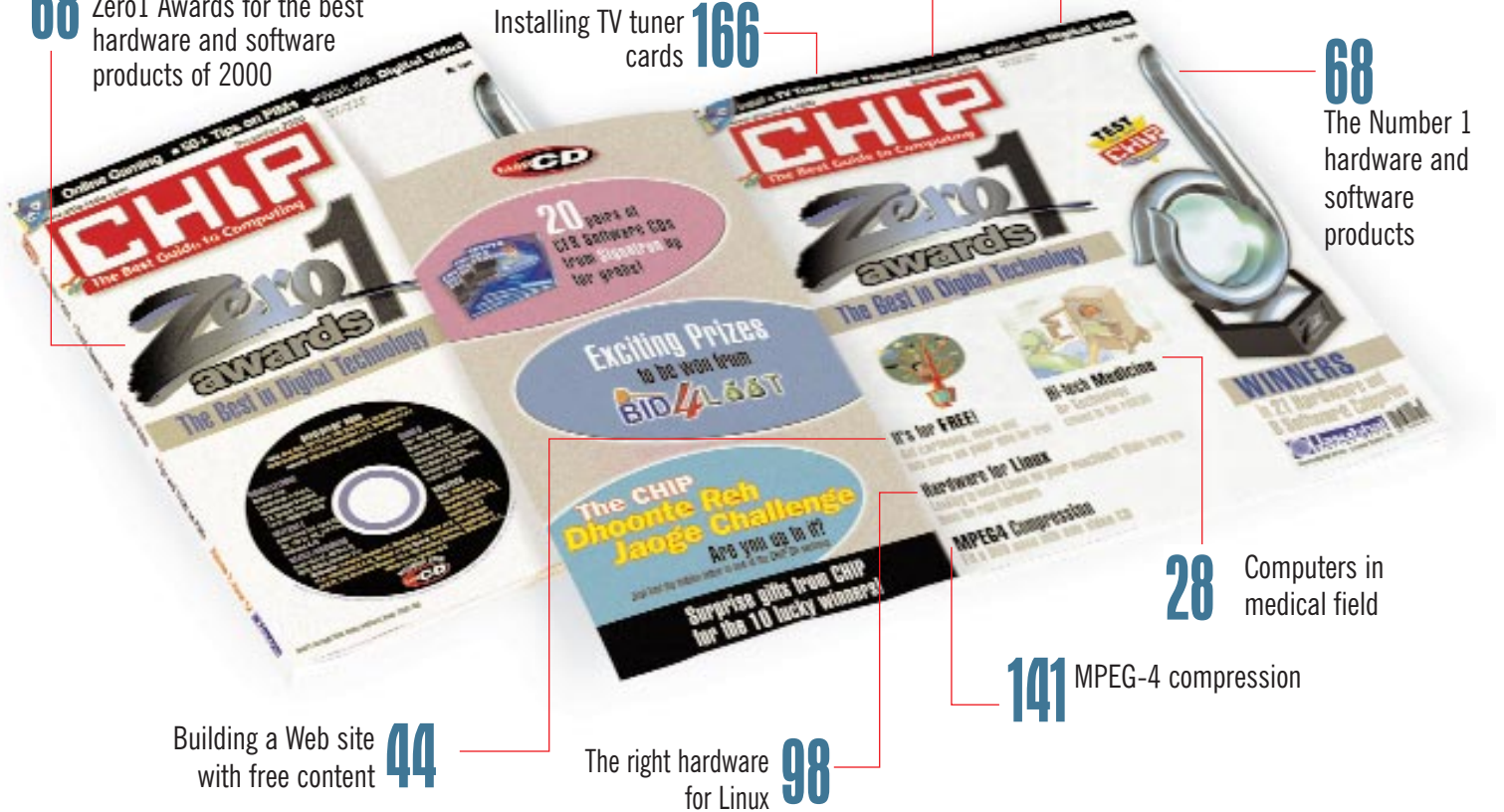

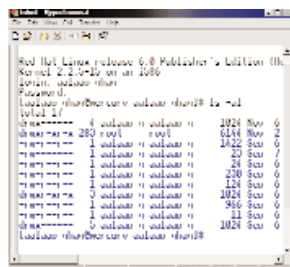

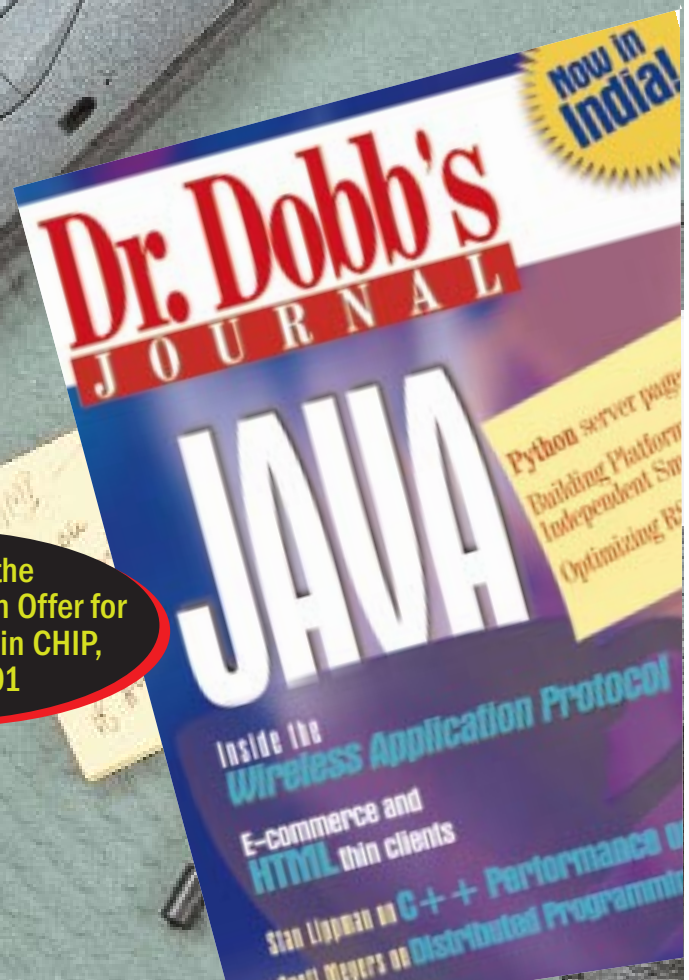

The Brain is Mightier than the Bureaucracy

My father the Indian Government started a 'Visa-in-a-Day' scheme, meaning that you get a visa to India on the same day you applied for it.
